César Muñoz Arconada (Astudillo, Palencia, 1898–Moscú, 1964) es uno de los escritores más representativos de la denominada Generación del 27, entendida ésta según los amplios márgenes de la última crítica literaria. Su firma apareció en las más importantes revistas de la joven literatura de la época. Fruto de estas labores son *En torno a Debussy* (1926), *Urbe* (1928) y *Vida de Greta Garbo* (1929). El salto estético e ideológico hacia posturas más comprometidas comienza a vislumbrarse en *La turbina* (1930) y *Tres cómicos del cine* (1931) y se afirma en sus novelas posteriores: *Los pobres contra los ricos* (1933) y *Reparto de tierras* (1934). En 1936 es una figura clave de la intelectualidad española afecta a la causa proletaria y social. Al finalizar la contienda civil, durante la cual ejerció de corresponsal de guerra y escribió sus *Romances de la guerra* y la novela *Río Tajo* (ambos de 1937), hubo de seguir el camino del exilio, en la Unión Soviética,

donde prosiguió con sus labores literarias hasta su muerte en 1964. En Tres cómicos del cine se transparenta, por un lado, el decidido interés por el género biográfico manifestado por los escritores más significativos de la vanguardia española y, por el otro, la enorme fascinación por el mundo del cine, signo definitorio de toda la época anterior a la guerra civil. En sus esbozos de tres figuras destacadas de ese mundo (Charlot, Clara Bow y Harold Lloyd), Arconada ofrece una deslumbrante muestra de su talento creador, llevando el género de la biografía vanguardista a unos extremos de insólita expresividad. Esta edición de completa con un amplio apéndice de escritos sueltos de Arconada relacionados con el cine así como una bibliografía de trabajos críticos sobre diversos aspectos de la relación entre el escritor y el mundo del cine. Nigel Dennis es catedrático de literatura española en la Universidad de St Andrews, Reino Unido, y autor de numerosos trabajos sobre los escritores más destacados del primer tercio del siglo XX. Se interesa especialmente por los prosistas de la época y ha publicado varios libros sobre la obra de José Bergamín así como ediciones

de textos de autores como Ramón Gómez de la Serna, Ernesto Jiménez Caballero, José Díaz Fernández y Ramón Gaya. Francisco Soguero es doctor por la Universidad de Deusto, donde actualmente ejerce como profesor de Literatura, con una tesis sobre la biografía vanguardista, centrada en la obra de Antonio Espina, Benjamín Jarnés y César Arconada. Además de varios estudios sobre la narrativa de la época, ha preparado ediciones de dos libros de Jarnés: El profesor inútil (Instituto Fernando el Católico) y El aprendiz de brujo (Residencia de Estudiantes). Study of the origin and development of civilization is of unequalled importance for understanding the cultural processes that create human societies. Is cultural evolution directional and regular across human societies and history, or is it opportunistic and capricious? Do apparent regularities come from the way investigators construct and manage knowledge, or are they the result of real constraints on and variations in the actual processes? Can such questions even be answered? We believe so, but not easily. By comparing evolutionary sequences from different world civilizations scholars can judge degrees of similarity and difference and then attempt explanation. Of course, we must be careful to assess the influence that societies of the ancient world had on one another (the issue of pristine versus non-pristine cultural development: see discussion in Fried 1967; Price 1978). The Central Andes were the locus of the only societies to achieve pristine civilization in the southern hemisphere and only in the Central Andes did non-literate (non-written language) civilization develop. It seems clear that Central Andean civilization was

independent on any graph of archaic culture change. Scholars have often expressed appreciation of the research opportunities offered by the Central Andes as a testing ground for the study of cultural evolution (see, e. g. , Carneiro 1970; Ford and Willey 1949: 5; Kosok 1965: 1-14; Lanning 1967: 2-5).
